

# **USSF/CNRA Referee Certification and Recertification Requirements**

As of 10/31/2013



## **For Immediate Implementation**

(except where noted - then beginning July 1, 2014)

After meeting with US Soccer in Chicago, Ill and consulting with CNRA State Director of Assessment, State Director of Instruction, State Registrar and other CNRA Advisors. I have concluded the direction CNRA shall move in response to the new and revised USSF Certification and Recertification Referee Requirements which are to be fully implemented beginning July 1, 2014 by all State Associations.

Most of these requirements listed shall become effective immediately as allowed by USSF. CNRA shall also immediately implement all other additional CNRA requirements as we are confident we can ensure our registration and administrative effectiveness during the transition. CNRA will then later adapt to ALL USSF minimum requirements and ANY ADDITIONAL CNRA requirements listed below in **Orange** to be fully implemented beginning July 1, 2014 or even possibly sooner when it becomes benefitting both administratively and for the general referee public..

**NOTES:** The most significant and complex changes CNRA has adapted to is USSF's modification and approach of the Grade 7 Referee certification and recertifications.

Historically, Grade 7 has been an advancement step from Entry Level Grade 8 that required significant game experience, one assessment, and a passing of a written test and fitness test. The Federation's approach is now VERY different as it is implementing a three tier approach of Entry Level Referees to serve the different levels of the game.

The three tiers of Referees Grades are now more clearly defined:

Grade 9: Recreational and Small-Sided Youth Games

Grade 8: Competitive Youth Games

Grade 7: Adult Amateur Games

It is CNRA's approach to maintain many of its prior requirements but also allow for additional ways for Grade 7 advancement and to eliminate the annual fitness requirements and reducing significantly the prior Game Count requirements. But also by adding the additional requirements to participate in a minimum number of Area and/or State Referee Academies offered to all by CNRA.

CNRA will adapt to these new approaches immediately. There are currently in 2013 Registrations, only 183 certified Grade 7 Referees in Cal-North, a 1.43% of CNRA's total referee population. Most of these referees are assumed to be working adult amateur matches and in addition, for many others, building upon their game count to advance to State 6 Referee. In addition to these Grade 7 Referees, there are 73 referees within Grade 1 - 6, less than 1% combined of the whole population. These referees also contribute to servicing the amateur game.

It must be assumed then that there are hundreds of Grade 8 referees that are able, willing and known and trusted

by assignors to be regularly working adult amateur level games at some capacity and yet remain identified only as a Grade 8 referee. These Grade 8 referees are either working to obtain experience and game count to advance later or are simply avoiding the additional requirements to maintain a Grade 7 or higher, i.e. cost and time of obtaining assessments and other additional testing. It is CNRA's goal to have these Grade 8 Referees that are actively serving the adult game to now more easily become Grade 7 Referees as soon as possible.

CNRA currently continues to maintain that to become a Grade 7 referee one must still first serve as a Grade 8 referee for at least six months and first gain on-the-field experience. Grade 8 referees may then advance to Grade 7 by one of two ways. They may display competence of the laws, procedures and game management as a referee in a match while being evaluated by an assessor or successfully participate in a "Grade 7 Entry Level Referee Course".

Being able to add an additional opportunity to advance to Grade 7 will better Identify these Grade 8 referees that currently and ably contribute to the adult amateur game. CNRA believes that these future Grade 7 referees will benefit by being identified as those with a broader skill set and experience. Assignors may therefore better identify those referees that either already do or are interested in working adult amateur assignments. CNRA through better identification of these referees will also be better able to serve this population with specific instruction and development that these referees require to be able to better perform specifically in the adult amateur game..

The Entry-Level Grade 7 Referee Course will be offered in due time, July 1, 2014 shall be our target date but this may occur sooner. These courses will naturally be very few since course sponsors will come from a smaller pool of sponsors from the amateur league/teams/assignors, CNRA or other.

Grade 8 and Grade 7 referees wishing to serve the amateur level game will now have an opportunity to obtain the special instruction required (beyond just the Laws) to serve this level and type of game more effectively by either demonstrating their skills during a performance evaluation during a match and/or take this Entry Level Grade 7 Course.

The Grade 6 State Referee NOW better begins the identifying of the truly interested and able referee that also desires to advance and serve the game at a higher (State, Regional and National) level.

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Immediately below as a reference is a comparison chart of each Grade with the complete USSF vs CNRA Referee Program Referee Grade Certification and Recertification Requirements. (Each of individual Grade Level is more visually identified and separated with the USSF Shield logo.)

Alongside the USSF (minimum) Requirements, CNRA has published what the State Referee Association (CNRA) shall implement (in addition) as our Referee Grade Certification and Recertification Requirements. Each of these are easily identified within the CNRA column, while items designated in **Orange** lettering and numbers indicate where CNRA shall implement a higher standard than what USSF has as their minimum standards.

Because these new and updated CNRA certification and recertification requirements have been reduced or maintained from prior years, CNRA is able to put these requirements into place immediately for current and upcoming 2014 registrations that are now already in progress.

CNRA will continue to evaluate this implementation of USSF requirements and CNRA's additional requirements to ensure that continued improvement, development and overall standards are met or exceeded to serve the varied types of games that are played and to meet or exceed the needs and enjoyment of our referee community.

USSF vs CNRA Referee Program (SAME)

**FIFA Sprint and Interval Tests for State Referee 6 and 5**  
**Beginning July 1, 2013**

**Administration**

**Sprint Test**

- Participants run six consecutive 40 meter sprints followed by a recovery period after each sprint (while walking back to the start line)
- Dynamic start with the front foot on a line that is 1.5 meters away from the electronic timing gates at the starting position
- If a participant falls or trips, they are allowed another attempt at that specific sprint
- If a participant fails one sprint out of the six, they are given one more attempt immediately after the sixth sprint
- If a participant fails two sprints, they fail the test

**Interval Test**

- Participants run a total of ten consecutive laps
- A lap consists of two 150 meter runs with two 50 meter recovery walks
  - Starts with running 150 meters in the prescribed time
  - Followed by walking 50 meters in the prescribed time
  - This process is repeated to complete one lap
- Walking area is marked by cones 3 meters on each side of the 150 meter marks
- If a participant fails to reach the walking area in the prescribed time, they are issued a warning
- If a participant fails to reach the walking area for a second time, they fail the test

**Notes**

- The time between the sprint test and interval test should be approximately 10 minutes  
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**State Referee Standards**

- Sprint Test
  - Maximum of 10 seconds per sprint
- Interval Test
  - Maximum of 45 seconds for the 150 meter run
  - Maximum of 45 seconds for the 50 meter walk

Emeritus Certification and Recertification Requirements  
Beginning July 1, 2013**

#### **Emeritus Referees**

The purpose of the Emeritus grades is to allow officials to retire from the game at the highest referee grade they attained. It may not be used to circumvent any registration, certification or recertification requirements mandated by U.S. Soccer or the State Referee Association.

To become an Emeritus Referee, the official must submit a personal letter of intent to the State Referee Administrator who will then initiate the appropriate paperwork. The official must have held the referee grade in question for a minimum of three years prior to the request. The three years do not have to be consecutive or immediately preceding the request for emeritus status.

For those Emeritus Referees looking to remain active, they must meet the established re-certification requirements each year for the level they want to officiate at and adhere to all registration requirements for that grade.

An Emeritus Referee may become reinstated as a referee so long as they meet the established certification requirements and adhere to all registration requirements for that grade.

**Grade 8 – Indoor Referee**

Since there are no universal Laws of the Game for indoor soccer, there is no formal training provided by U.S. Soccer. Individuals looking to officiate affiliated indoor competition may register with the State Referee Association so long as they are currently registered and certified at any grade level as either a Referee or Futsal Referee. Based on this, U.S. Soccer recommends that these officials adhere to the established local rules of competition to best service the game.
